

Elijah Astacio-Ortiz - Age 4 DANCER AND BOWLER

Elijah began receiving therapy services from UCP of Greater Cleveland in 2012 after his mom, Sandra, came across UCP's Facebook page. He was having a lot of trouble controlling his body movements, especially in his extremities, so he was not able to do much independently. The goal for each client is individual empowerment. For Elijah, this meant that at barely a year old, he would try using a power wheelchair. A special chair that could be maneuvered using only his head was trialed, and on his very first day, he was able to move around without assistance. It was obvious that this was one very bright boy!

Elijah is currently working on using augmentative communication devices to allow him to interact with others more easily. This access to the world has already brought about many changes in him, such as wanting to be more active and explore his environment. Elijah is more social at school; he also participates in more activities by using an Upsee, which allows him to walk in tandem with an adult. After coming to the UCP Family Appreciation Elks Bowling Night in 2014, Sandra learned that there was equipment available that would allow Elijah to bowl, and she found an accommodating bowling alley close to home that enables her and Elijah to enjoy one of their favorite activities together. They also go dancing every week where they use the Upsee to do hip-hop, salsa, ballroom dancing and more. With all this accomplished at such a young age, it is exciting to think about what his future might hold!





Madelyne Williams – Age 10 **ADVOCATE**

Madelyne is a bright and determined young lady who has been receiving therapy at UCP of Greater Cleveland for the past seven years. Her mom, Wendy, heard about the agency through a family friend whose son also attends UCP of Greater Cleveland. At first she was hesitant to drive the hour to and from therapy, but she soon realized it was worth the trip. At only 10 years of age, Madelyne has been hospitalized more than 40 times, primarily for issues related to cerebral palsy, GI problems and chronic lung issues. UCP of Greater Cleveland specializes in helping children who are medically fragile, allowing kids to be active to make their stay in the hospital shorter or, if possible, to prevent it altogether. Madelyne's therapy has helped to strengthen her core body strength and increase her endurance so she can recover from illness and surgery more quickly.

In June of last year, Madelyne participated in "Speak Now For Kids" Family Advocacy Day in Washington D.C., as a representative of Akron Children's Hospital. She was one of 35 children from across the country invited to speak to U.S. lawmakers. Madelyne and her mom told their story, conveying the importance of children's hospitals and the funding they receive from sources such as Medicaid. When Madelyne met with Senator Rob Portman, she saw that he had a canoe hanging on his wall. She immediately asked him if she could borrow it for the upcoming Cleveland Triathlon. After that, the senator was hooked on anything this vivacious youngster had to say. A few other highlights of the trip included fist bumping Senator Sherrod Brown and visiting the Washington Monument. This once-in-a-lifetime opportunity will not be forgotten by this small but mighty advocate.



Although she loves her job at the Zoo, she is currently working with a UCP of Greater Cleveland Job Placement Specialist to move into an individual community-based job to allow her to pursue her goal of more independence. She would like to continue in a career that involves working with the public, and also includes something that she is passionate about, such as working in retail due to her love of fashion.

When Viviana is not working, she enjoys delving into activities that leave her feeling positive about life. This has been especially important since her son's graduation from high school, a personal milestone of which she is very proud. She spent so long being a mom and caring for her only child, that it has been a transition for her to relinquish some of her parenting responsibilities. She now realizes it is important for her to take the time to focus on herself, which is one of the reasons she is looking to further her career. Outside of work, she enjoys singing in her church's choir. The church community and singing motivate her and give her the strength to keep going when life is hard. She is looking forward to this new phase of her life and the possibilities it brings.







Camille Thompson SINGER AND AVID BOOK LOVER

Camille has been attending UCP of Greater Cleveland's Organizational Employment program for two years. In all that time, you would be hard-pressed to find her without a book under her arm and a smile on her face. She always makes sure to greet the people she knows when they enter the building, including staff and Children's Services families. While Camille enjoys working at the agency's onsite workshop shredding paper, she is also interested in learning about other types of jobs, especially ones that involve helping others. Camille's helpful nature is quite apparent; you will often see her transporting clients who are in wheelchairs to and from activities, such as music therapy class. Camille is in the designated music therapy class that has evolved into UCP of Greater Cleveland's client choir. This choir performs at the agency as well as around the community, in places such as The Music Settlement and Cleveland City Hall.

Camille understands the importance of being involved with her community. Two of her favorite activities are visiting the library and singing in her church's choir. Camille's aunt takes her to the Shaker Library every Saturday so that she can pick out a new book, usually from one of her favorite series: Blue's Clues, Arthur or Berenstain Bears. She frequently takes the books to work so that she can look at them during her downtime, or when she just needs some time alone. In addition to reading, Camille's other love is singing. She is currently involved in her church's children's choir, but she is hoping that her experience there and with UCP of Greater Cleveland's choir will enable her to transfer to her church's adult choir soon.

Dawud has been receiving services from UCP of Greater Cleveland for over 11 years. His grandmother worked with the UCP Board Chair who referred Dawud to the agency for services. After an initial evaluation, it was clear that Dawud was a perfect fit for the Steps to Independence program. When he first arrived, Dawud needed assistance to walk, but much has changed since then. Today, Dawud receives therapy regularly at UCP of Greater Cleveland and is able to walk on his own, among other things. He is extremely athletic and self-motivated to achieve the goals he sets for himself. He practices Taekwondo, recently testing for his brown belt, and enjoys the confidence, positivity and independence it brings into his life. Because of his interest in athletics, Dawud's therapists make sure he is at his top-level of fitness, focusing specifically on balance and muscle strength.

Dawud is in high school and is also enrolled in postsecondary classes, working to earn pre-requisite credits toward a mechanical engineering degree. As with most teenagers, he is excited to be able to drive himself to different activities, and has worked tirelessly with therapists to gain the skills needed to obtain his driver's license, which he was successful in doing this May. Perhaps you will see him in the driver's seat taking his family to UCP's Race to Empower next year (they participate as a part of Team Dawud every year)! Dawud walks the one mile course and has made it his mission to beat his personal record from the prior year. This year, he walked the mile in 25 minutes, beating his previous record of 40 minutes 31 seconds. As this young man recently expressed to his mother, "The sky really is the limit."







Alex Lozano – Age 18 **BOWLER, TRIATHLETE AND** OVERALL SPORTS ENTHUSIAST

When Alex first started attending therapy at UCP of Greater Cleveland over two years ago, he had trouble going up and down stairs. However, with his unrelenting determination, Alex has mastered that task and has moved on to obstacle courses that mimic stepping up and down a curb. Upon first meeting Alex, it is evident that he is a social teen who loves sports. Referred to as a "true athlete" and a "go-getter" by his therapists, Alex isn't afraid to put in the hard work necessary to excel at sports. His athletic resumé is quite impressive, consisting of sports such as softball, skiing, bowling, biking, basketball, swimming and triathlons. Alex's favorite sport to play is basketball, which his therapists often use as a reward in therapy. He is also in two bowling leagues: Mentor High School Intramural and Saturday Juniors at Scores Fun Center. He and his brothers won the division tournament this year and will compete at the state tournament.

In 2013, Alex decided to join Team UCP at the Cleveland Triathlon to motivate himself to stay fit, and because triathlons include two sports he was already involved with: swimming and biking. He and his mom signed up to do the Super Sprint Triathlon, which involves swimming 300 yards, biking 8 miles and running/ walking 1.5 miles. Alex's family and friends traveled from as far as Philadelphia to watch him compete. After the mother and son pair crossed the finish line, they agreed they would continue to be a part of this fun and inspiring day for years to come. During that first triathlon, Alex placed 1st in his age division, and in 2014 he placed 3rd. Alex truly embodies the phrase "with hard work, there are no limits."


BUSINESS ADVISORY COMMITTEE


