Agency Highlights

Adult Day Support (ADS) - We have been quite busy at all of our ADS facilities. Westlake is approaching capacity of 40 clients and Highland Hills continues to grow with 24 clients, including 6 in their new Easy Street room. In May, all of our locations celebrated Mother's Day, with a "Cleveland Moms Rock" luncheon. Some future dates to look out for: 1) The week of June 29th we will have cookouts at all three locations; 2) On July 22 UCP will be participating in a day of festivities as Cleveland celebrates the 25th Anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) at Wade Oval park; and 3) Be watching for dates for our Luau's going to each location in August. In addition to all of the activities, we continue to make the Employment First Initiative our focus by enhancing the Hybrid program curriculum to include "Job Readiness" materials and discussions. We would also like to thank Michelle Sprinzl, LPN, for enhancing staff training with monthly In-Services on a wide variety of program and client centered topics. We welcome back ADS Assistant, Natanya Thompson, after the birth of her daughter.



Organizational Employment (OE) - In the spirit of the Employment First Initiative, an OE client, Marian, is participating in a community-based assessment at the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo this summer with Aramark. Two additional OE clients have tested the waters of community employment, doing assessments with other agencies. Harvest for Hunger had another successful campaign under the guidance of the OE Giving Back Group. They hosted a canned food drive and also raised \$607.64 through a Malley's Chocolates sale and a hot dog sale.

Community Employment/Transition Services - It is finally here - summer in CLE! The sun is shining bright along with our awesome clients in CE. Just as we are finally seeing the seeds we had sown in early spring burst out of the ground, the hard work and dedication of our PS staff, job placement specialists, and interns are beginning to materialize. As each site begins its graduation ceremonies, there are a few interns who are already employed. Currently 8 interns have competitive jobs that will allow them to continue to grow as independent young adults. Although all of the clients in CE are amazing individuals, we are proud to announce that this year's Adult Services Boots Fisher Award was given to our very own, Viviana Hernandez. This award has been given to a Zoo employee two years in a row. Our site supervisor at the Zoo, Claire Mahon, deserves a round of applause for being such an incredible support to her clients and going above and beyond her responsibilities. Way to go, Claire! We are all excited for a little fun in the sun this summer, but we won't be taking much vacation because, after all, employment is our business!



Children's Services - So far this year, Children's Services has served 147 children and 22 adults in our Traditional Therapy Program, as well as 20 children in our Steps to Independence Program. The summer Steps Program officially started on June 15, and we expect to serve over 50 children in those two summer sessions. The Children's Services Day Program continued to serve two students who have had steady gains and are planning to continue Extended School Year (ESY) services in the summer as well as join us for the 2015 and 2016 school year. The 2014/2015 school year ended the week of June 1 with great success - over 400 students were served! We continue to expand OT and PT services in the schools and served over 7 school districts this year. This spring/summer, Children's Services hosted two great events for our clients: Go Baby Go! and Power Trip: The Revolution Tour 2015. On May 16, UCP hosted the first ever Go Baby Go! Cleveland event in partnership with Cleveland Clinic Children's Hospital for Rehabilitation and Cleveland State University. Over 150 volunteers, families and therapists were available to witness 24 special needs children drive adaptive ride-on cars on their own for the first time in their lives. A big "thank you" goes out to Katie McGregor who worked long hours to plan, organize and facilitate the event. On June 4, Permobil hosted the one day "Power Trip: The Revolution Tour 2015" event on UCP's property to introduce their new line of wheelchairs to community therapists, families and UCP clients. Our children and adult clients had a chance to "test drive" several power wheelchairs and enjoyed a day of sun and food.



Group Homes - New staff faces abound in our group homes and we are very excited! The summer holds many bright opportunities for our clients to get out and enjoy the nice weather and things Cleveland has to offer. Recently, some of our clients from Memphis attended the Razzle Dazzle concert at the Beck Center in Lakewood as well as Dave & Busters in Westlake. They are looking forward to a trip to the drive-in movie theater this summer as well as a Crusher's Baseball Game in Avon and an Antique Engine Show in North Olmsted. They will also be hosting a summer Luau soon, with an afternoon and evening filled with Hawaiian-themed music and fun on our patio. In June, Brandon, Charles, and Kristin participated in Parade on the Circle, dressed in full costume! Edendale Home hosted a Physical Crisis Intervention training in May to help staff manage challenging behaviors of clients. The client are also enjoying the warmer weather - having dinner on the patio as well as nice walks through the neighborhood. Recent outings have included seeing Monique at the Improv Comedy Club, music concerts at the Coventry Library and trips to the lake to fish and enjoy the sunset. We've also had a few celebrations here, including Ron's 78th birthday and Eugene's 56th birthday. Upcoming events for Edendale include trips to see live bands at the Euclid Beach Reservation, feeding ducks at the duck pond and also a July 4th cookout celebration filled with music and games.



Development - Thank you to all of the employees and their family members who made it out to the 3rd annual Race to Empower 5k and One Mile Fun Run on May 3rd. We had a beautiful day for the event, and 37 employees came out to participate in the race and BE WELL—not counting all those who volunteered and came to watch! Congratulations to Westlake ADS, who were the big employee team winners with the highest percentage of employees participating! They all celebrated their win with a pizza party at Westlake. The Race to Empower as



a whole had over 630 racers and raised \$35,000 in support of UCP of Greater Cleveland programs. This summer will be a busy one for the agency's Development staff. The 65th Annual Meeting was held on June 16 and celebrated the 2014 accomplishments and milestones of employees, clients and partners. At the Annual Meeting, we also announced the new names and logos of our two major programs. We will be rolling out a series of events throughout the summer complete with new banners and materials to market our programs to the community. Be on the lookout for an employee celebration coming soon for the new names!

Focus on Wellness

In this edition, the focus is not on health tips, but a behavioral change that doesn't require any equipment, special diet, or a time commitment. This simple change would keep you and others healthy and safe....stop driving while distracted. Distracted driving is any activity that diverts a person's attention away from the primary task of driving. All distractions endanger driver, passenger, and bystander safety. These types of distractions include:

- Texting
- Using a cell phone or smartphone
- Eating and drinking
- Talking to passengers
- Grooming
- Reading, including maps
- Using a navigation system
- Watching a video
- Adjusting a radio, CD player, or MP3 player

But, because text messaging requires visual, manual, and cognitive attention from the driver, it is by far the most dangerous distraction. The best way to end distracted driving is to educate your friends and family members about the danger it poses. In this section, you will find facts and statistics that are powerfully persuasive. If you don't already think distracted driving is a health and safety problem, please continue to read to learn more.

Key Facts and Statistics

In 2013, 3,154 people were killed in motor vehicle crashes involving distracted drivers. This represents a 6.7 percent decrease in the number of fatalities recorded in 2012. Unfortunately, approximately 424,000 people were injured, which is an increase from the 421,000 people who were injured in 2012.

As of December 2013, 153.3 billion text messages were sent in the US (includes PR, the Territories, and Guam) every month.

10 percent of drivers of all ages under the age of 20 involved in fatal crashes were reported as distracted at the time of the crash. This age group has the largest proportion of drivers who were distracted.

Drivers in their 20s make up 27 percent of the distracted drivers in fatal crashes.

At any given daylight moment across America, approximately 660,000 drivers are using cell phones or manipulating electronic devices while driving, a number that has held steady since 2010.

Engaging in visual-manual subtasks (such as reaching for a phone, dialing and texting) associated with the use of hand-held phones and other portable devices increased the risk of getting into a crash by three times.

Five seconds is the average time your eyes are off the road while texting. When traveling at 55mph, that's enough time to cover the length of a football field blindfolded.

Headset cell phone use is not substantially safer than hand-held use.

A quarter of teens respond to a text message once or more every time they drive. 20 percent of teens and 10 percent of parents admit that they have extended multi-message text conversations while driving.

Employee of the Month

New VOYA Investment Platform

Next month we will begin the process of converting UCP's 401(k) Plan to a new system platform. We have selected an enhanced service model from our current provider which will offer more investment selections with lower fund expenses.

The conversion process will start on **Monday, July 6th and end on Wednesday, July 15th** when the first contributions will be made to the new plan. This period of time is referred to as a "blackout period" when (1) you will not be permitted to request a distribution; (2) change allocations or transfer assets from one fund to another; (3) rollover or transfer assets to or from another plan; or (4) access your account for inquiry purposes.

Please note: ALL your investment options will be affected. All your current investment selections will be allocated to the Vanguard Target Retirement Portfolio of Funds according to your year of birth which will be used to anticipate your expected year of retirement.

After July 15th, you may want to log into your investment account to reallocate your funds from these Target Retirement Funds. At that time you will have the option to move your funds into the VOYA investment funds you had previously elected or into some or all of the new investment funds that will be available to you under this new system platform.

More information will be available as we get closer to the end of the blackout period.

More Retirement Planning Information

Did you know that last year the Social Security Administration (SSA) created a new service to help you plan for retirement? You can go onto their website (www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount) to set up a personal online Social Security account.

You will want a "my Social Security" account to:

- Keep track of your earnings and verify them every year;
- Get an estimate of your future benefits if you are still working;
- Get a letter with proof of your benefits if you currently receive them; and
- Manage your benefits:
 - Change your address;
 - Start or change your direct deposit;
 - Get a replacement Medicare card; and
 - Get a replacement SSA-1099 or SSA-1042S for tax season.

Setting up an account is quick, secure, and easy. You probably have noted that you are no longer receiving your *Social Security Statement* periodically in the mail. But now you will have access to all your Social Security information 24/7/365 once you set up your personal account.
