Highlighted Outcomes

LeafBridge Services—Camp LeafBridge was established to provide students with disabilities experiential learning opportunities while at the same time promoting therapeutic outcomes with 84% of campers demonstrating progress toward their Individual Education Plan (IEP) goals.

OakLeaf Services—OakLeaf Partners placed 114 individuals in independent jobs in the community. New and ongoing partnerships to enhance community integration and movement on the path to employment were created at various organizations, including volunteer and educational opportunities at local libraries, area nonprofits, food banks and nursing homes. All activities are based upon individual choice and integration and career goals.

Development—The development effort raised \$1,061,379 in 2017 representing more than 10% growth over the previous year. 17% of funds were attributed to new and lapsed donors. The Development Committee of the Board of Directors is actively engaged in promoting Board giving, corporate partnerships and streamlining development strategies.

AGENCY LEADERSHIP & ADMINISTRATION

- Agency leadership expanded on the donor cultivation and stewardship plan with a focus on engaging previous and lapsed donors, former Board of Directors members and enhanced corporate giving in an effort to build organizational capacity and support ongoing efforts to promote mission-related sustainability and growth.
- The organization received a three-year accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF), a legacy which spans over forty years. This distinction illustrates the quality, value and positive outcomes of agency programming, administration and governance, exceeding expectations and receiving high praise in all areas.
- The agency enhanced engagement of the management team to increase connectivity and build upon a positive organizational culture.
