## **MEET ELIJAH**

Elijah is a delightful 11-year-old boy who is always happy to see you! He was born premature and was soon after diagnosed with cerebral palsy, which affects his muscle strength and speech, so he relies on assistive technology devices to help him move around and speak.


When Elijah started receiving UCP therapy services at 17 months old, he communicated using only his facial expressions. There were so many things Elijah wanted to say, and the UCP team tried out many different speech devices to see which would work best for Elijah. They finally found one that he excelled at that uses eye gaze technology. This would make it possible for him to interact with the world using a mouse that is controlled with his eyes. To make this work, Elijah needed a new wheelchair that allows his body and head to be positioned in the right way.

The process of finding the perfect seating system for Elijah was long and complicated. This included selecting the proper equipment, receiving insurance approval, not to mention locating ALL the different pieces and parts needed. Even after everything arrived, the UCP team had to work with an outside company, Miller's, to build the perfect wheelchair customized for Elijah.

On October 5, 2021, Elijah arrived at UCP in his old, adapted stroller. He left a few hours later beaming from ear-to-ear in his new, blue custom manual wheelchair (which can even fold to fit in his mom or dad's car)! His new chair provides him with the right position he needs to participate in school, navigate his home and more easily integrate into the community. When asked if he liked the chair and if he was comfortable, he immediately answered "Yes!"

Elijah's ability to use his eye gaze communication device has drastically improved since he received his new wheelchair. He is now able to discuss an array of topics, such as requesting assistance, expressing his opinions and answering questions. His personality has blossomed because of this assistive technology. He has always been called "Smiley" here at UCP because of his infectious smile, but we are getting to see his smile even more now because he is able to express his thoughts without difficulty or frustrations. Most importantly, he knows he is finally understood.

With his new wheelchair and communication device, Elijah's future is full of possibilities!

## COMMUNITY FUNDRAISING EVENT SPOTLIGHT: CLEVELAND GAMING CLASSIC

Although Tom Jenkin's day job is the Director of Global Services for Hyland Software, he has a personal passion project: planning the Cleveland Gaming Classic (CGC). The event began 10 years ago through a shared love for gaming amongst a small group of friends in a Cleveland basement and has since blossomed into an event that attracts over 2,000 people

from across the country. The CGC features video games, toys, collectibles, tournament competitions, card games, comics, tabletop games, legendary icon meet-and-greets, nostalgia and much more.

When the pandemic began, Tom was not sure what to do with the event that he anticipated hosting in the fall of 2020. As Tom continued to explore his options, he knew it would be in the best interest of all participants to host the CGC virtually. However, he felt that it was missing something: a charity presence. Tom, who is a UCP Board Member, reached out to UCP's development team to form a partnership. For the first time since its inception, the event included a fundraising component as well as appearances by UCP clients and employees.

Tom, with the help of a dedicated team of volunteers, transitioned the CGC back to an in-person event in 2021 while welcoming in a record-number of attendees. In just two years, the CGC has raised over \$11,000 for UCP programming!

# **CUSTOMIZED EMPLOYMENT WORKS FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES**

Shira started working with UCP's OakLeaf Partners in late 2020 to learn job-seeking skills and ultimately apply for, obtain and retain employment. While her previous jobs involved cleaning, she desired to work in an office environment. OakLeaf Job Placement Coordinator, Greg Zaryk, helped her build interview skills, and in December 2020 she participated in a mock interview with emeritus UCP Board Member, Ron Barber.

The mock interview went so well that Ron expressed interest in hiring Shira at his consulting firm when there were less pandemic-related restrictions. After a call from Greg in Spring 2021, Shira started working three days per week as an Office Associate at RG Barber Consultants, CPA's where she assists with administrative duties including scanning and filing. She also provides light office cleaning such as vacuuming and dusting.

This is a great example of customized employment, a process for achieving competitive integrated employment through a relationship between employee and employer that is personalized to meet the needs of both parties. Her position incorporates Shira's previous experience in providing cleaning services after her administrative duties are complete. She quickly increased her hours and now works four days per week and recently received praise from a client of the firm who, after visiting the office, said "Shira is a breath of fresh air."



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
